Relational justice in/and psychological research May 3, 9:00-10:00am ET Marginalized communities such as LGBTQI people are often mistreated by researchers due to "relational injustice" – a form of inequality that encompasses a formally and structurally maintained prejudice toward specific sociodemographic groups, incorporating topics of study, communities worked with, and specific questions asked and ignored. Psychotherapists are well aware of how these social and political dynamics can be harmful. In therapy, we strive to create a safe space for the client to repair the relational injustice they have suffered. These skills can help us better understand and conduct research with marginalized communities in order to restore relational justice.
